Recover through our Spiritual Principles

Our 12th Step tells us that we have a "spiritual awakening" as the result of these Steps and that we are to "practice these principles in all our affairs." If we go looking through our literature, the indexes do not refer to the "principles," so where do we find them? They are embedded deep within our Steps, Traditions, Concepts, slogans, and our literature. There is a passage in our book Paths to Recovery – Al-Anon's Steps, Traditions, and Concepts, that lists about 4 of the principles ... and there are so many more.

Today, I want to challenge people to start looking for, think about, identify, and embrace the spiritual principles we have in our Legacies: Steps, Traditions, Concepts.

What is a Spiritual Principle?

Define Spiritual Principle:

Spiritual: relating to or affecting the human spirit or soul as opposed to material or physical things.

Principle: a fundamental truth or proposition that serves as the foundation for a system of belief or behavior or for a chain of reasoning.

SO ... A **spiritual principle** is a truth or creed that we choose to live by. They are different from values because they don't include things such as family or finances. They are universal concepts that help us to become better people.

1. Our common welfare should come first; personal progress for the greatest number depends upon unity.

3. The relatives of alcoholics, when gathered together for mutual aid, may call themselves an Al-Anon Family Group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation. The only requirement for membership is that there be a problem of alcoholism in a relative or friend.

4. Each group should be autonomous, except in matters affecting another group or Al-Anon or AA as a whole.
